

Knowledge Organiser: Poetry- Sonnet

Key Learning

• The sonnet is one of the most common traditional poetic forms. William Shakespeare wrote some of the most famous sonnets.

Sonnet Rules

- A sonnet is fourteen lines long.
- The fourteen lines are divided into three groups, or "stanzas," of four lines each, followed by a final two-line "couplet."
- Each of the fourteen lines is ten syllables long.
- Each of the three stanzas has an ABAB rhyme scheme. This means that the first and third lines of each stanza rhyme with each other, and the second and fourth lines rhyme with each other.
- The final couplet has an AA rhyme scheme, meaning that those two lines rhyme with one another.
- The last line should state what the sonnet is about.
