### Key sketchbook moments

- Recap and experiment with colour wheel and focus on mixing own colours

- Children to be given an image of the Great Fire of London, children to use the whole image or part of the image and stick in corner of the page-ch to mix colours to represent the fire.
- Children to compare the paintings of GFOL to the work of David Best and discuss if they are all art. Which is their favourite? Why?
- Use inspiration from selected work to create final piece, either as a large collaboration or individually.
- Paint background using their own mixed colours, ensuring they make enough, focus on shades and shape of flames. Use David Best's work for detail of buildings.
